Re: Redacted civil demurrer packet

Dear [CLIENT NAME REDACTED],

We looked through the documents you sent us. A few items appear worth checking before anything is filed or signed, so we listed them below in the order that may be most helpful.

Here are the items that may be worth checking before the documents are filed or signed:

- The notice on page 1 leaves the hearing date blank while listing a time and department. Please check whether the intended date should be entered before the document is used.
- The title on page 1 refers to a demurrer to the complaint, while pages 4 and 15 refer to the first amended verified complaint. The packet may be clearer if the document title and the pleading being addressed are described consistently.
- The caption on pages 1 and 15 appears to contain several wording and punctuation problems, including “individual” instead of a separator after one party, repeated uses of “and individual” where “an individual” may have been intended, “and unknown Company,” and the singular label “Defendant” for a list containing multiple defendants. Please check and standardize the caption.
- The notice sentence on page 2 states that the defendant “will Demurrer” to the complaint. “Demur” may have been intended as the verb, and the sentence may be worth proofreading.
- The introduction on page 3 states that the parties signed the necessary documents in September 2020, while the following paragraph describes the payoff and finalization meeting as occurring in May 2022. The chronology may be intentional, but it may help to check that both dates and the description of when the transaction was finalized are consistent.
- Page 4 states that “the pleadings are uncertain and fails to state a cause of action.” The subject and verb may not agree; the sentence may read more clearly after checking whether “pleading is” or “pleadings are” was intended.
- Page 5 uses “Barbozoa’s,” which appears different from the spelling used elsewhere in the packet and may also use an unnecessary apostrophe. Please check the intended party name and possessive form.
- Page 8 refers to “Count Seve,” which appears to be an incomplete spelling of “Count Seven.”
- Page 8 states that there are no allegations that the defendant “as present” during execution of the deed. “Was present” may have been intended.
- Page 9 twice uses “MATTEWS,” while the name appears with an additional letter elsewhere. Please check the intended spelling and make it consistent.

- Page 11 states that “Paragraphs 84 and 85 again alleges” and later that “Paragraphs 82 through 96 allege a causes of action.” These phrases may need subject-verb and singular-plural corrections.
- Page 12 states that plaintiffs make one allegation “while at the same conceding” another. The phrase may be missing the word “time.”
- The conclusion on pages 12 and 13 uses “helplessly unintelligible,” “losses cased,” and “fulfilled all of its obligations.” These phrases may be clearer after checking whether “hopelessly,” “losses caused,” and a plural pronoun or revised subject were intended.
- Page 14 begins with “so the are making,” which appears to be missing the letter “y” in “they.” The same page uses “at sometime,” which may be clearer as “at some time.”
- The first and last pages include a long internal-looking file identifier, a template date, and a template website in the page header or footer. Please check whether those drafting or template details are intended to remain in the filed and served version.
- Page 2 contains a typed date, attorney name, and representation line, but no visible handwritten or electronic signature appears. If this is intended as the final signature page, please check whether the signer wants to complete it before filing.
- The proposed order on page 15 leaves the “with / without leave to amend” alternatives unselected and leaves the date and judicial signature area blank. These blanks may be intentional for court completion, but the filer may wish to check that the proposed order is presented as intended.
- The recipient mailing address was not included in the uploaded packet. Please confirm the address to be used for correspondence.

Redacted Civil Demurrer - Checklist

- [] Check whether the hearing date should be entered on page 1.
- [] Make the document title and the pleading being addressed consistent.
- [] Proofread and standardize the party caption on pages 1 and 15.
- [] Check whether “will Demurrer” should read “will demur” on page 2.
- [] Check the September 2020 and May 2022 chronology in the introduction.
- [] Correct the subject-verb wording in the first paragraph under the grounds for demurrer.
- [] Check the spelling and possessive form of the party name on page 5.
- [] Correct the incomplete “Count Seve” wording on page 8.
- [] Check whether “as present” should read “was present” on page 8.
- [] Make the spelling of the defendant’s surname consistent on page 9.
- [] Correct the subject-verb and singular-plural wording on page 11.
- [] Check whether “at the same conceding” should include “time” on page 12.
- [] Proofread “helplessly,” “cased,” and the pronoun agreement in the conclusion.
- [] Correct “so the are making” and check “at sometime” on page 14.
- [] Remove the internal file identifier and template details if they are not intended for filing.
- [] Check whether the signature area on page 2 should be completed.
- [] Check that the blank alternatives and court-completion lines in the proposed order are intended.
- [] Confirm the client mailing address for correspondence.
